claw concerns an underprivileged young man watching his so called superiors ursula is howard barker's typically intriguing take on the legend of st ursula he stumbled is a fable concerning an anatomist and a dying king and in the love of a good man we witness the mass burial of the dead

arnold wesker has written over 43 plays and has been translated into 16 languages

a diverse selection of contemporary plays from a range of established and up and coming playwrights based in france edited and translated by chris campbell literary manager of the royal court and a foreword by dr clare finburgh of the university of kent the volume includes rémi de vos till death adeline picault bobine and mikado magali mougel erwin motor devotion lancelot hamelin alta villa

features the plays debris osama the hero after the end and love and money the four plays in this

first collection by dennis kelly are linked by their characters desperate need to believe that there is more to life than the often brutal worlds in which they find themselves kelly s remarkable debut debris finds humour and pathos in a spectacularly dysfunctional family unit the harrowing osama the hero shows a group of neighbours taking ill defined revenge on an odd ball teenager in a climate of fear in after the end a woman discovers she has been rescued from armageddon by a paranoid ex colleague with a nuclear bunker in his garden and in a fractured narrative love and money portrays a marriage driven to brutal destruction by financial pressures

from a colonial past to a precarious european present this selection of works by contemporary writers challenges the accepted vision of the spain to explore the national themes historical legacies and modern day concerns of a country of great geographical and cultural diversity a basque history by borja ortiz de gondra 2017 max award best playwright explores the impact of war regional and national identity language and culture on the basque people of the iberian north the sickness of stone by blanca domenech an idealistic restoration expert clashes with an old school pragmatist over the best way to acknowledge and heal the wounds of spain s bloody and oppressive past cuzco by víctor sánchez rodríguez a spanish couple travels to peru to save their relationship but find themselves confronted by post colonial guilt depression and disconnectedness the greyhound by vanessa montfort this comic tale of a homeless greyhound explores the clash between the eu s prosperous north and the austerity stricken mediterranean on the edge by julio escalada explores the little known underworlds of spain s north african territories where the fight for survival leads to prejudice volatility and violence

a diverse selection of plays from the nineties noughties and 2010 s from a range of established and up and coming playwrights based in greece the collection includes a foreword and introductions to each play by prominent academics in greek contemporary theatre 1 m a i r o u l a by lena kitsopoulou translated by aliki chapple 2012 2 angelstate by nina rapi translated by the author 2015 3 wolfgang by yannis mavritsakis translated by christina polyhroniou 2008 4 hungry by charalampos giannou translated by the author 2016 5 juliet by akis dimou translated by elizabeth sakellaridou 1995

explores how women playwrights illuminate the contemporary world and contribute to its reshaping collected together for the first time are four works by young british playwright thomas eccleshare whose plays have been performed to national and international acclaim over the past decade plays one includes pastoral winner of the verity bargate award 2011 i m not here right now heather and instructions for correct assembly exploring themes including parenthood the power of stories and the meaning of truth in the modern world this collection presents one of the bright new writing talents in uk theatre

inua ellams has established himself as one of the most distinctive voices in british and international theatre collected together for the first time are four of ellams acclaimed plays including the 14th tale untitled black t shirt collection and knight watch

this handbook offers a multiform sweep of theoretical historical practical and personal glimpses into a landscape roughly characterised as contemporary irish theatre and performance bringing together a spectrum of voices and sensibilities in each of its four sections histories close ups interfaces and reflections it casts its gaze back across the past sixty years or so to recall analyse and assess the recent legacy of theatre and performance on this island while offering information overviews and reflections of current thought across its chapters this book will serve most handily as food for thought and a springboard for curiosity offering something different in its mix of themes and perspectives so that previously unexamined surfaces might come to light individually and in conjunction with other essays it is a wide ranging and indispensable resource in irish theatre studies

heroin by grace dyas trade by mark o halloran the art of swimming by lynda radley pineapple by phillip mcmahon i alice i by amy conroy the big deal edited by una mckevitt oedipus loves you by simon doyle gavin quinn the year of magical wanking by neil watkins edited and introduced by thomas conway this anthology comprises eight new plays by irish playwrights premièred between the years 2006 and 2011 these playwrights ride however in no slipstream of the identifiably irish play here the enterprise of playwriting itself is being re imagined here above all else is a commitment to becoming in the theatre for all that each play is concerned with what is unfinished business in ireland how astonishing then that these plays should revolve for the most part around identity and in particular sexual identity how identity comes into play how we open up the field of play how we raise into collective experience the exercise of that play the urgency in the playwriting would appear to lie precisely here we can read from the historical moment from a narrative emphasizing an economic bubble and its hangover into these plays or we can take these playwrights at their word and observe lives lived at the contour of identities in the making it is for us as readers just as we have as theatre goers frequently scandalized enthralled shamed appalled unburdened tickled pink to decide

if one of the problems facing new playwrights is the expectation that each of their plays should be similar in style wade proved that you could radically change both form and content not every writer delivers on their early promise as this collection clearly shows wade certainly has aleks sierz from his introduction colder than here laura wade s play is a 90 minute masterpiece a jewel dark but translucent it is a play of love death and grief the grief that is hardest to bear because it begins before the loved one dies sunday times breathing corpses the tension the emotions and the sense of absurdity and fear are brilliantly handled a terrifying tour de force sunday times other hands this is an extraordinary feat a vicious satire with a heart of gold wrought with peculiar subtlety and intelligence the spectator

this new series brings together some of the best new writing from contemporary american playwrights volume one is introduced by andre bishop artistic director of the lincoln centertheater the most prestigious theatre in the usa each play is introduced by critically acclaimed writers themselves the volume includes kin by bathsheba doran with an introduction by chris durang kin sheds a sharp light on the changing face of kinship in the expansive landscape of the modern

world simply terrific perhaps the finest new play of the season funny and audacious haunting and exquisitely wrought charles isherwood new york times *middletown* by will eno with an introduction by gordon lish *middletown* was awarded the prestigious horton foote prize for promising new american play in 2010 *middletown* glimmers from start to finish with tart funny gorgeous little comments on big things the need for love and forgiveness the search for meaning in life the long lonely ache of disappointment charles isherwood new york times *completeness* by itamar moses with an introduction by doug wright *completeness* is a 21st century romantic comedy about the timeless confusions of love a funny ridiculously smart new play i haven't seen another play recently that so perfectly captured love hot blooded fearless flickle at this stage in life i was left with nothing but admiration jeremy gerard bloomberg news *god's ear* by jenny schwartz with an introduction by edward albee this ode to love loss and the routines of life has the economy and dry wit of a sondheim love song schwartz is a real talent and she is trying something ambitious in her very modern way she is making a rather old fashioned case for the power of the written word jason zinoman new york times

if the essence of drama is conflict the crossing of wills of culture versus barbarism the norwegians have a natural spring to tap into and it is explosive line rossovoll artistic director of the norwegian centre of new playwriting from her introduction the oberon anthology of contemporary norwegian plays brings together a selection of exciting playwrights reflecting the breadth and vitality of norwegian theatre's booming new writing scene six plays translated by neil howard and published for the first time in english demonstrate a common willingness to push formal boundaries and to find new ways to tackle the universal experiences of the human condition grief and loss violence manipulation abuse and despair grief work by eirik fauske *kinder k* by kristoffer grønstad a remarkable person by pernille dahl johnsen time without books by lene therese teigen why not before by liv heløe watching shadows by hans petter blad

two little known priestley plays which while they are quite different have important features in common the 31st of june is a comedy set partly in an advertising agency and partly in a medieval castle jenny villiers is a serious play set backstage in an old provincial theatre but both exploit elements of time in the 31st of june scenes switch between modern times and the middle ages while characters move between both there are kings company bosses princesses fashion models dwarves and two rival magicians causing confusion and romance jenny villiers examines life in the theatre the doubts of the present are confronted by players from the past and a jaded playwright recovers his faith in the theatre both plays were performed on the stage but later rewritten and published as novels

the third volume in the successful theatre café series contains three contemporary european plays in english translation all fairly short two handers the plays make a great volume for teachers and students looking for suitable material to work on in schools colleges and youth theatre groups the volume contains clyde and bonnie by holger schober translated by zoe svendsen mothers hide your children fathers hide your savings clyde and bonnie are back in town a brief synopsis of what happened before clyde whose real name is werner and bonnie which is her real name parents can

be so cruel meet each other fall in love and start robbing banks on the occasion of their 10th bank robbery bonnie gets shot and killed clyde takes refuge in a bar and is actually still sitting there so much for part one but what clyde did not know is that he and bonnie have a daughter who is now 16 and somehow feels that she doesn t fit in with the family she lives with she doesn t know that they are her foster family if the first part of the play was a love story then the second is the story of a father and a daughter an evening about responsibility love and also about how to stay cool when the cops are hot on your heels the play won the austrian theatre for young people award stella in two categories incl best production in theatre for young people 2009 helver s night polish by ingmar villquist translated by jacek laskowski helver s night is an expressionist drama about the relationship between carla and her young charge helver helver is fascinated by fascism not by the ideology which he is unable to grasp but by the show off aspects of the movement in the end he becomes a victim of this fascination busstopkisser german by ralf n höhfeld translated by vanessa fagan a boy a girl a bus stop 18 kisses over 18 months coffee and conversation by candlelight a picnic under the eiffel tower then the girl vanishes but was she ever really there can anyone without an email address or mobile phone actually be real a funny unusual take on the classic boy meets girl scenario busstopkisser takes the audience on a mind bending tweet sized journey through adolescent romance

dennis kelly is one of the uk s finest contemporary dramatists this second volume of his work collects together our teacher s a troll orphans taking care of baby dna and the gods weep also features a foreword by journalist author and critic aleks sierz without doubt kelly is one of the most multi talented british playwrights to emerge in the last decade aleks sierz from the foreword

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
